

New Rules for Alcohol Sales in Ceduna

New rules for alcohol sales in the Ceduna area will come into effect in an effort to curb alcohol-related health and welfare issues and public order and safety issues.

These conditions follow consultation with the SA Police, District Council of Ceduna, representatives of the local communities, health and service providers, and licensees.

The rules have been imposed by the Liquor and Gambling Commissioner for a trial period of six months. The Commissioner has the power to impose licence conditions to address public health, welfare and safety concerns.

Following the six month trial, a review of the restrictions will be undertaken and feedback will be sought from the Ceduna community, communities across the West Coast, licensees, government agencies and service providers. The effectiveness of the restrictions will also be assessed throughout the duration of the trial.

Consumer and Business Services will be working with licensees and the community throughout the trial to ensure the safe and responsible service of alcohol.

New takeaway alcohol sale rules in effect from 17 September, 2015

- Everyone must show identification to purchase takeaway alcohol.
- Licensees may only sell one 750ml bottle (or less) of spirits per person per day. Should two or more bottles of spirit be purchased, licensees must record the person's details including name, address and identification number in a maintained register.
- Licensees may only sell one 2L cask to a person in one day.
- Licensees may not sell port or fortified wine for takeaway purposes.
- Licensees may not sell alcohol for takeaway purposes to a person whose address is recorded as 'prescribed lands' identified as: Oak Valley Community, Maralinga Tjarutja Lands, Yalata Reserve, Tjuntjunjara, Umoona Community, Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (APY) Lands, Ngaanyatjarra Lands and Tjuntjuntjara Lands.

If you live in the following areas, it is **PROHIBITED** to buy take-away alcohol.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA

- Yalata Reserve, Oak Valley, Maralinga Tjarutja Lands, Umoona Community, Tjuntjuntjura, Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (APY) Lands.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA

- The Ngaanyatjarra and The Tjuntjuntjura Lands.

Licence Conditions imposed 17 Septemeber 2015

1. The licensee shall not sell or supply liquor for off-premises consumption to any person who does not produce photographic identification.
2. Photographic identification means a current driver's licence, international passport, proof of age card issued by the Department of Planning, Transport & Infrastructure or equivalent in another Australian State or Territory.
3. The licensee shall not sell or supply liquor for off-premises consumption to any person who resides at a 'prescribed land' identified as Oak Valley, Yalata, Tjuntjunjara, Umoona Community, Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (APY) Lands, Ngaanyatjarra Lands and Tjuntjuntjura Lands in Western Australia.
4. The licensee shall not sell or supply port or fortified wine for off-premises consumption.
5. The licensee shall ensure that the sale or supply of spirits for off-premises consumption is limited to the maximum bottle capacity of 750ml. Any purchase of 2 or more bottles will require the purchasers name, address and ID number recorded.
6. Only one 2 litre cask is allowed per person per day.
7. Conditions 4 & 5 do not apply to the sale and supply of liquor by the licensee to the holder of some other current liquor licence for consumption on those licensed premises.

And it is noted on the licence that:-

- These conditions will take effect on 17 Septmeber 2015 for a 6 month period with a review to take place after 3 months, or at an earlier time at the Commissioner's discretion.
